We are privileged to have highly qualified educators, including PhD and Master's degree holders, whose research and expertise will undoubtedly contribute to the school's growth. The school is excited to congratulated a young, respectful, committed and hard -working teacher Dr Agrippa for acquiring a Doctor of Philosophy qualification (PhD) from the University of the Witwatersrand. He taught us balance and time management by achieving the top qualification in the academic hierarchy and still produce the best results in his subject, Tourism, in the district. We also congratulate another dedicated, respectful, committed and hard -working teacher for acquiring a Master of Science in Mathematics, MSc, Ms Sindhu Alex. She is very instrumental in the efficiency of the academic office, a real engine driving the success of academic calendar activities, a family person and yet managed to manage her time effectively. The school directly benefits from anyone's added academic achievement.

Additionally, more than 80% of our teaching staff is in possession of postgraduate qualifications, further reinforcing my confidence in the high standard of education being delivered at this esteemed institution. Their advanced knowledge and skills ensure that students receive the best possible learning experience, positioning Khanyisa as a leader in educational excellence.

While our matric results have not significantly improved in recent years, they remain above both the provincial and national averages, affirming Khanyisa High School's continued excellence. After carefully analysing the situation, we identified key factors contributing to this, including our first-come, first-served admission policy and the growing issue of alcohol and substance abuse among the youth. Additionally, we have observed that the hardships many of our students face at home and in society greatly affect their focus and, consequently, their academic performance. As such the school has an inhouse psychologist who offers counselling and therapeutic services to students at no additional cost to parents. Despite these challenges, Khanyisa remains a top-performing institution.

In full cognisance of this reality, I respectfully urge parents to actively engage in their children's lives, spend quality time with them and provide guidance. Many of our students face significant challenges that can be deeply traumatic, and the

school cannot address these issues alone. I also encourage our youth to equip themselves with the resilience needed to overcome life's battles. Challenges are inevitable, but true success comes from perseverance. If you keep pushing forward, no matter the obstacles, you will ultimately reach your destination.

I am pleased to present the academic performance report currently for the year 2024:

Grade 12 : 90.88% out of 285 candidates
Grade 11 : 96.42% out of 307 learners
Grade 10 : 90.04% out of 261 learners
Grade 9 : 90.18% out of 163 learners
Grade 8 : 88.31% out of 136 learners

The success of the school's academic life is due to the dedication and expertise of our capable academic team, whom I hold in the highest regard. We are fortunate to have a strong, healthy working relationship, which greatly benefits the school. Beyond their academic excellence, each member has taken on additional responsibilities in the school's overall operations. ACADEMIC REPORTS

SCIENCE REPORT

The Mathematics and Sciences Department at Khanyisa High School, the largest department in the school, includes Mathematics, Physical Sciences, Life Sciences, Agricultural Sciences, and Information Technology. We are proud to share the various activities our learners have participated in, which showcase their growth, innovation, and hard work across different disciplines.

Eskom Expo for Young Scientists and Engineers

On 16 August 2024, Khanyisa High School hosted the Regional Eskom Expo for Young Scientists and Engineers at Fr. Fischer Hall. The event brought together numerous schools, judges, and esteemed guests, including professors from UNISA's Physics and Astronomy Department. Three of our teachers, Mr. T. Tshuma, Ms. A. Rolo, and Ms. S.S. Bodlo, were invited to serve as judges, while 15 of our learners presented 13 outstanding projects. Our learners earned medals in the bronze, silver, and gold categories, showcasing their creativity and innovation. Two of our learners, Ndonvela Ovayo and Aluncedo Mabandisa. both in Grade 11, have been selected to represent Khanyisa High School at the International Science Fair (ISF) in Johannesburg in late September.

Life Sciences and Natural Sciences Olympiads

In July 2024, 22 of our Grade 10–12 learners participated in the Life Sciences Olympiad's first round, and 24 of our Grade 8 and 9 learners participated in the Natural Sciences Olympiad. We are eagerly awaiting the results of both competitions.

Mathematics and Mathematical Literacy Olympiads

Our learners participated in the Old Mutual South African Mathematics Olympiad, where 25 learners showcased their mathematical skills. Out of this group, three learners advanced to the second round, and we are awaiting their results. Additionally, for the first time, 15 of our Mathematical Literacy learners participated in the SA Mathematical Literacy Olympiad, and their results are also pending.

Energy Efficiency Competition

On 1 August 2024, our school participated in the Energy Efficiency Competition hosted by King Sabata Dalindyebo Municipality. The learners' essay on energy efficiency, climate change, and sustainable energy use earned the school a certificate and a cash prize of R2000, which will be used to purchase energy-saving gadgets for the school. The learners involved were:

Youth Climate Change Council Debate

On 15 September 2024, three of our learners—Maqubela Thalanda (11C), Ndonyela Amange (11D), and Mnci Zusakhe (10D)—participated in the Youth Climate Change Council Inter-School Debate, hosted by the KSD Municipality. Their contributions to the debate were insightful and reflected their deep understanding of climate change issues.

Agricultural Sciences Department Activities

The Agricultural Sciences Department has also been very active this year. Our Grade 12 Agricultural Sciences learners conducted a practical experiment on 10 and 17 February 2024, where they slaughtered a sheep and learned about the anatomy and agricultural importance of the animal. This handson experience deepened their understanding of agricultural practices.

On 3 May 2024, the Grade 12 Agricultural Sciences learners visited the Agricultural Sciences College in Tsolo. This visit exposed them to various career opportunities in the agricultural field, broadening their horizons and inspiring many to pursue agriculture-related careers

Additionally, our Grade 10 learners visited the East London Agricultural Grounds and the zoo on 29 April 2024. This trip provided them with an enriching experience of agriculture in practice, giving them a better understanding of the theoretical knowledge they learn in the classroom.

Practical Knowledge across Grades 8–12

The Science Department is committed to providing learners with practical knowledge that complements the theory they study in the classroom. Throughout Grades 8–12, learners have participated in a variety of practical experiments, designed to give them hands-on experience and a deeper understanding of scientific concepts. These practicals are crucial for learners to apply their theoretical knowledge to real-world situations and develop critical thinking skills.


The learners came well-prepared, with some even bringing their own gazebos to set up their stalls. Entrepreneurs' Day provides Grade 8 and 9 learn-

Our Grade 11 learners took a field trip to Durban in mid-August, visiting agricultural industries like the sugar production sector. This gave them a hands-on look at the agricultural industry.

On May 3rd, 2024, our Grade 12 classes embarked on a trip to Tsolo Agricultural Rural Development Institution (TARDI). The learners were exposed to practical applications of classroom lessons, such as animal production (lactation, milking, animal health), plant production, hydroponic systems, and aquaculture. We extend our sincere appreciation to the TARDI principal, staff, and support team for their warm welcome and the valuable knowledge they shared with our learners.

GRADE 12 PRACTICAL INVESTI-GATIONS

Our Grade 12 practical investigations were held on February 10th and 17th, 2024. This has become an annual tradition at Khanyisa, where we follow the recommendations of our director, Mr. VK, whose guidance has enriched the department. These investigations focus on the alimentary canal of ruminant and monogastric animals, with learners gaining hands-on experience in identifying organs responsible for various functions, such as digestion and assimilation. The learners were enthusiastic and gained significant practical knowledge.

SCIENCE DAY / ESKOM EXPO

Our Science Day was a success, with dedicated teachers encouraging learners across science grades to participate in various projects. Some of our agricultural science learners took part in the Eskom Young Scientist competition this year, and the event was a great experience for all involved.

CAREER EXHIBITION

Last year, a group of Grade 12 learners visited TARDI for a career exhibition, where ten learners were selected to attend. Among them, several gained admission to study veterinary sciences and related disciplines at universities across South Africa this year. The exhibition aimed to expose matric students to career opportunities in the veterinary field, a profession in high demand in South Africa, and it delivered positive results.

ation towards their teachers throughout the trip







TRIP TO TSOLO, TARDI

Grade 12 Agricultural Science students from classes 12A and 12F embarked on an educational tour to Tsolo on May 3rd, 2024. The trip began at 8:00 a.m., and each student contributed towards the cost of food and transport. The primary purpose of the tour was to provide practical field experience and career guidance, which is a key part of the syllabus.

The destination was TARDI Agricultural College in Tsolo. Mr. Israel and Mr. Bilson demonstrated their deep care for us as Grade 12 Agriculture students by organizing this valuable trip. The tour was highly impactful, broadening our knowledge of the agricultural industry and offering us a hands-on, visual, and interactive learning experience beyond what we gain from textbooks.

Our first stop was at the clinic, where we learned how they maintain records for the animals treated there. This showed us that animal health is handled much like human health, with careful analysis and examinations to diagnose illnesses. From there, we visited the lab, where blood and tissue samples are tested for pathogens.

Next, we toured the dairy facility, where cows are milked. With the help of the college's workers and students, we were taught how to test for diseases like mastitis and the importance of cleanliness in dairy operations. We also learned how to monitor milk quality to ensure it's healthy.

We then visited the farm, where we were shown safe and effective ways to handle large farm animals, such as cattle. Lastly, we explored the production facility, where rabbits were kept. This was a new discovery for us, and we eagerly learned about rabbit farming, their unique shelters, and their nutritional needs.

One of the most significant parts of the trip was learning about rabbit farming, which was completely new to us. We also found the dairy facility fascinating, especially the lessons on detecting bacterial diseases in dairy cows.

We would like to express our gratitude to the principal, the
















Khanyisa High School offers a diverse language curriculum, including IsiXhosa as a Home Language, English as both a Home Language and First Additional Language, and Afrikaans. The department is supported by a dedicated team of 25 educators who are committed to fostering language development among students.

WHAT WE HAVE DONE THIS YEAR

Resource Development: We actively sought and secured additional educational resources, including updated textbooks, digital learning tools, and supplementary

materials, to enhance language instruction and provide diverse learning experiences.

Professional Development Workshops: Our educators attended regular professional development sessions at Trinset and online, focusing on effective teaching strategies for multilingual classrooms, incorporating technology into language instruction, and addressing the specific needs of students from diverse linguistic backgrounds.

Differentiated Instruction: To cater to the varying language proficiency levels of our students, we adopted differentiated instruction techniques. This included developing tiered assignments and offering additional support for struggling learners, ensuring that all students could engage meaningfully with the content.

In addition to our usual achievement of 100% pass rate, our vision for the year 2025 also encompasses:

Enhance Language Proficiency: We endeavour to implement innovative teaching methods and resources that foster mastery in IsiXhosa, English, and Afrikaans, ensuring students can communicate effectively in diverse contexts.

Promote Multilingualism: Encourage a culture of multilingualism by celebrating linguistic diversity and providing opportunities for students to engage with multiple languages, enhancing their cognitive and social skills.

Integrate Technology: We are fortunate that Khanyisa High School has projectors and whiteboards. Accordingly we plan to continue leveraging technology to enhance language learning experiences, incorporating digital tools that facilitate interactive learning, collaboration, and access to a wider range of resources.

Support Educator Growth: Invest in the continuous professional development of our educators, equipping them with the skills and knowledge needed to adapt to evolving educational practices and meet the diverse needs of our students.

Conclusively, in the year 2025, we envision our language department as a leader in fostering linguistic and cultural excellence, preparing students to thrive in a globalised world while embracing their unique South African identities.

HEAD OF AFRIKAANS DEPARTMENT: NGL VAN RENSBURG.

It is once again time to reflect on the progress, the achievements and the failures of the past year and to set new goals for the future. We, Mr. N. van Rensburg, Ms. M. Thomas and Ms. U. Bodlo in the Afrikaans Department, have made satisfactory progress in a few areas. We are happy with some achievements and the successes we have had, but there is always room for improvement or then at least to put a sound enough effort into our work, to maintain an acceptable standard in all the classes.

The matric results for the third term of 2024 were satisfactory, but there also cases where huge improvements are needed. The Afrikaans Department was hoping for even better results in general but the 2 level 7's in grade 12 were expected. Afrikaans is usually not taken seriously. The fact that 5 learners achieved a level 1 mark in grade 12 is a big concern. The Matric results in September 2024 should have been much better. We always ask for Afrikaans to be included in the time table for afternoon classes as well as for classes on some Saturdays. We are very grateful for the recognition given to Afrikaans as a subject. Afrikaans was included in the time table for the Spring School.

Afrikaans remains a very difficult subject for those learners who are third language speakers or even for foreign learners who attempt Afrikaans. Learners from other cultural groups, other than IsiXhosa, usually take Afrikaans and then English Home Language. There are those who can speak Afrikaans but the opportunity to do so never or seldom arises in Mthatha.

The decline in the numbers of learners who are attempting Afrikaans is a concern, but then it is also understandable. There are learners who are Xhosa speaking, but because they find Xhosa very difficult they do Afrikaans instead. Afrikaans is marginalised as an official language and more and more universities are now forced to change their language policy to offer only English as a medium of instruction.

Although we still have a reasonable number of learners per grade who are interested in taking Afrikaans as a subject, we as teachers will have to see to it that the learners who do take Afrikaans are benefitting from doing so. The learners must feel that doing Afrikaans is to their advantage and that it is not just a subject to make up their curriculum. At present 180 learners are doing Afrikaans. The numbers are down from previous years.

The department consistently demonstrates strong organizational practices, with comprehensive lesson plans, assessment programs, and structured work programs established and effectively maintained. These measures ensure that teaching activities are systematically planned and align with departmental goals, supporting a cohesive educational approach. We had again the opportunity in 2024 to do team teaching as Afrikaans classes in Grade 11 and 12. We produced a work plan for all the grades for 2024. New set works (poetry for Gr. 10, 11 and 12 were introduced. Grade 12 also changed the text for drama. We shall support the teachers teaching literature to have a clear understanding of this genre.

The performance of the learners in the different grades are as follows:

The Subject advisor also gave clear direction with regards paper 3 (Creative writing).

We need to ensure that all aspects of the syllabus are thoroughly covered when it is done in a lower grade to cut out

the repetition of the same aspects of work year after year in all the grades. We need to do this to give us more time to cover all the different forms of contextual writing and essays. Moderation of learner's work, daily meetings and class visits must be conducted on a regular basis to ensure that we maintain a very good standard of teaching in the Afrikaans Department. Extra lessons will be offered again when the time table committee allocates a time slot. Usually Afrikaans gets a slot during the winter school and holiday classes. Should there be classes it will be arranged by the school and letters will go to the parents. Khanyisa High School had normal teaching classes during the March/April break for grade 12's, Winter School for grade 12's and perhaps normal classes during the September break.

We are going to use the technology in class and social media more often to communicate with learners, using the internet (e-mail), WhatsApp and the learners' cell phones. We

also use the available information on the internet, covering about all the aspects of the grade 10, 11 and 12 syllabi in the class. Load shedding sometimes inconveniences the use of social media.

We honestly hope to improve on our teaching performances in all the grades in the 2024.

ISIXHOSA

DEPARTMENTAL REPORT

South Africa is a country with a rich linguistic diversity, having 12 official languages including the latest addition, South African Sign language.

Many schools in the Eastern Cape offer isiXhosa as a Home Language since this language is a mother tongue in many in this province.

Khanyisa High School is an English medium school with the admission policy of "First come first served". IsiXhosa is offered as one of the home languages. There are 8 isiXhosa home language teachers under the leadership of Ms A.R. Rodolo.We normally receive leaners who are doing isiXhosa Home Language in Grade 8 and some of them are beginners in this language. Sometimes we even get learners who are new in isiXhosa home language in grade 11. People may think that it is easy to teach and learn isiXhosa, but

mark my words, it is not that easy. It is not easy because of the society that we live in. It is hard to learn isiXhosa because many learners are not always exposed in this language because even in their homes they are always encouraged to speak English and also at school all subjects are taught in English. Even around school premises, learners speak English because our school is an English medium school. Despite all that, due to the dedication and commitment of our teachers and the hard work of our learners, we always manage to produce 100% quality results every year.

In 2023, we had 242 learners who were doing isiXhosa in grade 12. All these learners achieved with good results. Out of the 242 learners, 63 of them got distinctions and 108 of them got level 6. Is this not quality? We work as


The competition was fierce, with three strong teams in our category. But when it was time for Khanyisa to hit the floor, our cheerleaders truly shone.

On Saturday, August 3rd, Khanyisa's momentum only grew. They overwhelmed the Great Attackers with a decisive 7-0 win, showcasing their attacking prowess. This victory was followed by another dominant performance, defeating Ngangelizwe 8-0 and solidifying their place in the semi-finals.

The semi-final match on Sunday, August 4th, saw Khanyisa face off against City Lads. Maintaining their winning streak, they cruised to a 3-0 victory, earning their spot in the highly anticipated final.

The final match against the Black Lions was a fiercely contested battle. Both teams played exceptional attacking football, but Khanyisa ultimately demonstrated their superiority, securing a 2-0 victory. With this win, Khanyisa was crowned the Mthatha Under-15 Soccer Champions. The team was awarded gold medals and a trophy to mark their incredible achievement.


creating an ambiance where beauty and joy seamlessly intertwined.







































FOUNDER'S DAY





The concept was simple but deeply impactful: students were invited to leave their shoes at home and go barefoot for a day, experiencing a small part of what many children in our country endure daily.

Across various communities, many children walk long distances to school without the luxury of footwear, a basic necessity that so many of us take for granted. The absence of shoes can lead to serious challenges, from walking on rocky, hot, or even muddy roads to facing potential injuries. The Leave Your Footprint initiative was designed to give students first-hand insight into these realities, bridging the gap between their everyday comforts and the hardships faced by others. From the very beginning, students were encouraged to embrace the opportunity to understand what it means to go without.

They quickly realized that the absence of shoes wasn't just uncomfortable; it was a constant reminder of the challenges so many children face in accessing education. As one student shared, "I never thought walking barefoot could be so tough, but it's made me appreciate everything I have."

The Leave Your Footprint initiative has left a powerful impression on students, fostering a more compassionate and socially aware mindset. For many, it was a lesson in gratitude and empathy that went beyond books and classes. They now

understand that making a difference can start with something as simple as walking a day in someone else's shoes—or, in this case, without them.

INSIGHTS FROM THE SOFTWARE DEVELOPMENT

WORKSHOP

On May 25, 2024, a one-day workshop was held for Grade 10 and 11 learners studying Information Technology (IT) and Computer Application Technology (CAT).

The school invited Ms. Dilu Joseph, an IT professional from India and a former teacher at Khanyisa High School, to speak at the event. Ms. Joseph provided valuable insights into software development and the career opportunities within the fields of IT and CAT. She explained that software development involves creating, designing, deploying, and maintaining software, which consists of programs that instruct a computer on what tasks to perform. Software operates independently of hardware, making computers programmable, and is categorized into three main types.

Summary of Software Creation Roles

Software development is carried out by programmers, software engineers, and software developers, whose roles often overlap.

• Programmers (coders) write source

code to program computers for specific tasks, such as database management, online order processing, or displaying information. They typically follow instructions from software developers and engineers and use languages like C++ or Java.

- Software engineers apply engineering principles to design software and systems that solve general problems, using modeling languages and tools to develop broad solutions.
- Software developers have a less formal role than engineers, focusing on specific project areas like coding while also overseeing the software development lifecycle, including requirement analysis, team management, testing, and maintenance.

Software Development Process from Idea to Reality

1. Analysis: Understanding what the software needs to do through techniques like document analysis, stakeholder interviews, observation, workshops, and prototyping.

- **2. Planning:** Laying the foundation by defining objectives, task lists, team roles, tracking progress, anticipating problems, and estimating costs.
- **3. Design:** Creating detailed blueprints, system design, and software architecture, focusing on functionality, scalability, and user experience (UI/ UX).
- **4. Development:** Writing the code based on design, turning ideas into a working product. This phase takes the longest and is guided by clear requirements.
- **5. Testing:** Ensuring functionality through various tests (system, unit, integration, functional, performance, and user acceptance) to verify the software works as expected.
- **6. Deployment:** Releasing the software using methods like blue/green deployment, canary development, or shadow deployment to ensure smooth transitions or rollbacks if needed.
- **7. Maintenance:** Ongoing bug fixes, updates, performance monitoring, security patches, and user support to keep the software running smoothly.





48 HOUR FILM FESTIVAL COMPETION

The 48 takes place on different weekends in different cities throughout the year. In each city local Film Teams - from beginners to pro's - compete to make a short film in only a weekend! Do you and your friends have what it takes to make a film on the fly? It all begins with the Friday night Kickoff event when you and teams in your city draw genres out of a hat and receive the required elements for your film. Then it is off to the races—writing, shooting and editing and doing whatever it takes to submit your short film on Sunday night.

The big payoff is seeing your masterpiece in the big screen at a local theater. Every film, both on-time and late, will screen. There is nothing better than seeing your film with an audience and seeing firsthand how they react to your movie. At the city awards event, the winning films—as determined by local judges—are announced. More than a dozen awards are given—from Best Acting to Best Directing to the top prize: Best Film. What happens after the local 48? The top films earn more exposure. The Best Film in each city screens at our annual international film festival—Filmapalooza. This fest features screenings, workshops and parties and is attended by filmmakers from around the world. At the Awards Ceremony we announce the Grand Champion of the Year!

Project Details – Pre-Production

Belong Media Productions with Khanyisa High School Grade 12 Drama Learners registered and participate in this year's competition of making a film within 48 hours, which started on Friday, 9 August - 11 August 2024. We gathered on a Friday night, waiting for the toss at the cinema in Mall of Africa so that we could be given details and elements that we had to involve in the making of our film. We discussed the script over whatsapp group with our learners in preparation for the shoot the next day, since they couldn't be able to be with the rest of the writer's team in the script room for the night.

Production Day

On Saturday, in the morning we gathered at Khanyisa High School for brief with the learner's and teachers before we started production. We did casting of which our learners were all playing lead roles as actors on this film because the main focus was for them to gain experience and explore more within this career of which is in line with their subject (Dramatic Arts). We spent the whole day shooting, having started at the school, to Ngangelizwe and finished our shooting in Dicolyn. Ms. Mano, Ms. Mzilikazi and Mr. Ncwane were with the team and coordinating the project as we wrapped up in the evening. Mr. Lunga Makuzeni, the school driver transported the learners to their respective homes after we completed production without any key challenges

Post – Production, Administration & Submissions

On Sunday it was the last day of the completing the project, we edited, did administration and we were able to finish and submit on time which qualified our film to be able to be screened at the cinema and eligible for awards on the following weekend.

- o Meaning 100% of our actors were high school learners
- Highlights: Being able to finish shooting and submitting the film on time with students who are inexperienced and participating for the first time in this competition was extra ordinary.
- o Eligibility for screening at the cinema

and competing for the awards

- Results and Outcomes: The whole point of being involved in this competition was for the benefit of the learners, the experience of working under-pressure away from class- their comfort zone, learning the practical skills on the aspects of their subject, being able to start to create and finish a product within regulated time, and as well being able to see their work and themselves at the screens of the cinema.
- o They were able to receive a 48 hour film project certificate of recognition & completion international which will be very beneficiary towards their careers and be part of their portfolio when applying for the university in medium. They have a record and reference of their work at the cinema and will use them for their monologues during auditions or casting whether for a role or entry at a drama/ film school and for bursary application. The school as an associate will be highly recognized for participating in a project of this nature as it is the first time for non-film academic institution to be involved and will therefore get a certificate of recognition.

Conclusion

Although we didn't win an accolade because of the experience and the quality of the competing teams this year, the team has tried their best among other professional film productions that were competing. The standard was too high but at the end of the day our learners won because they were able to get the experience they needed, the exposure learning and as well the certificates which will be their highlight as they will be departing to search for better opportunities after matric and this is a very high level practical experience for the subject at the school and for the exposure of the institution in this province. It is only Khanyisa High School in the entire province to give their learners such a bigger platform and unique experience as it encourages and motivate learners to start thinking big about their dreams in this creative industry.




On Thursday, we visited the Shark Board, where we learnt about sharks

HISTORY OF KHANYISA HIGH SCHOOL

SEBASTIAN VATTAKUNNEL

In early 1993, a determined group of individuals, led by Mr. Francis Mbina, sought the support of Rev. Fr. Urs Fischer, then Parish Priest of All Saints Catholic Cathedral in Umtata, to establish a new school in Payne's Farm. Father Fischer, renowned for his dedication to youth education—evident from his transformative work at St. Joseph's School in Norwood and Holy Cross High School—was approached due to his proven track record and passion for educational development.





In January 1994, Father Fischer approached Mr Sebastian Vattakunnel to start a new school in KwaPayne Location.Mr Vattakunnel made an astronomical jump into the unknown without infrastructure, furniture, students and teachers.

Despite his previous successes, Father Fischer initially hesitated to support the new venture. The challenges were formidable: there was no existing building or land, the political climate was unstable in 1993, and there was insufficient funding for construction. Nevertheless, the determined group persisted, persistently advocating their cause until they gained approval from the Transkei Department of Education. The Department, impressed by the achievements of St. Joseph's, Holy Cross, and Zingisa Schools, consented to the creation of a new state-aided school, with the church responsible for infrastructure and materials while the department would cover teacher salaries. Four teaching grants were allocated for the nascent Khanyisa Senior Secondary School.

The situation for Khanyisa was dire: there were no available religious Sisters to staff the school, rampant political violence jeopardized safety, and the school lacked basic infrastructure, furniture, and students. Schools across the region were reopening on January 10, 1994, but Khanyisa faced significant obstacles. The Department of Education issued an ultimatum, giving the committee 15 days to launch the school or risk losing the teaching grants.

In a desperate bid to save the project, Father Fischer turned to Mr. Sebastian Vattakunnel, the acting Deputy Principal of Zingisa Comprehensive School, to lead the new initiative. Despite initial reluctance, Mr. Vattakunnel agreed, plunging into the challenge with only administrative experience and faith in divine providence. On February 18, 1994, Khanyisa Senior Secondary School officially opened its doors at Kwa Payne, utilizing a small hall within an outstation parish of All Saints Cathedral. This marked the courageous beginning of Khanyisa's journey amidst adversity.

The inaugural staff of Khanyisa Senior Secondary School comprised Mr. Sebastian Vattakunnel, Mrs. Mapengo, Mrs. Nomonde Madikizela (Timakwe), and Mrs. Shirley Mammen. Observing the intense demand for quality education and the admission rush at established schools, Mr. Vattakunnel decided to forego entrance tests, implementing a policy of first-come, first-served. Recognizing the vital role of Mathematics in shaping students' futures, he mandated that all learners at Khanyisa take the subject, a significant decision given that, at the time, Mathematics was often only offered to select students.

Despite the daunting challenge of starting a new school without a proven track record, the community's faith in Khanyisa was fueled by the reputation of Mr. Vattakunnel, coming from the well-regarded Zingisa Comprehensive School. By late February 1994, Khanyisa had enrolled 93 students into two Standard 8 classes (now Grade 10). The Department of Education had approved four teaching grants but left the task of procuring furniture and books to the school. With limited resources, teaching began in a partitioned parish hall measuring 18m x 6m, and administrative tasks were managed from the principal's car until an office could be established.

Mr. Vattakunnel taught Physical Science and Mathematics, Mrs. Mapengo handled English and Biblical Studies, Mrs. Nomonde Madikizela taught IsiXhosa and History, and Mrs. Shirley Mammen covered Biology and Agricultural Science. Geography was added when Mr. Babalo Ncanisa, a student teacher, was brought in to fill the gap.

A key challenge was finding a suitable location for the school. Efforts with the KwaPayne headman and his council proved unfruitful, leading the team to approach the KwaLindile community. After several negotiations, KwaLindile agreed to provide a portion of a small hill, previously offered to Shell for a petrol station, for the school's use. With a donation of R250,000 from Father Fischer, construction began on five classrooms and an office. Rather than hiring a large construction firm, Mr. Vattakunnel oversaw the project, managing materials and local labor while continuing his teaching duties.

By January 1995, Khanyisa relocated to the new premises. The arrival of Franciscan Clarist Congregation (FCC) sisters from India included Sister Recy, who took on Mathematics teaching and financial management. The school fee was set at R400 per year, and enrolment surged to 235 students, necessitating additional classrooms. In 1996, a new block of classrooms was built, and Khanyisa celebrated its first matriculation with 58 students, 56 of whom passed with commendable results. This success led to an influx of new applications.



When Khanyisa moved from KwaPayne location to the new premises in January 1995, Franciscan Clarist Congregation (FCC) sisters from India came to Umtata to help the Catholic Church. Sr. Recy, FCC, joined Khanyisa in 1995 as Mathematics teacher and was responsible for School Accounts.

Despite a strong start, internal conflicts arose. Five teachers, funded by the Department of Education, sought to remove Mr. Vattakunnel, supported by a teachers' union and some departmental officials. However, the students and their parents opposed this move, leading to acts of sabotage. Ultimately, the High Court intervened, granting Khanyisa autonomy and resolving the conflict.

Khanyisa Senior Secondary School's journey of growth and development is a testament to the relentless commitment of its founders and supporters. Initially a modest institution with only a handful of teachers, Khanyisa quickly evolved into a beacon of educational excellence and community service.

Early Developments and Expansion

Upon becoming fully private, Khanyisa removed the government-funded teachers and received invaluable support from the Board of Trustees, led by Mr. Mabentsela, and the School Governing Council under Mr. Vuyani Siga. Parents such as Mr. Mda and Mrs. Tozama Madubela played crucial roles in supporting the school's mission.



January 1995, Khanyisa moved from KwaPayne Location to the new premises. That year our enrolment increased to 235 learners and this necessitated additional classrooms.



In 1996, the second block of classrooms was constructed. That year Khanyisa presented its first group of matriculants. Of the 58 students who sat for the examinations, 56 passed with good quality symbols. This was noted by parents, prospective learners, the general public and the Department of Education hence an influx of learners seeking enrolment.

In 1998, the school added six more classrooms, and by 1999, the construction of a School Hall, two Science laboratories, and a kitchen was underway. The official opening and blessing of the new facilities took place in October 2000, officiated by Bishop Oswald Heirmer. By 2001, two additional blocks were constructed.

Curriculum and Facilities Enhancement

The school's management realized that covering lost ground in junior classes was crucial for the students' success. Consequently, in 2003, Khanyisa expanded to include Grades 7, 8, and 9, with the construction of a new block to accommodate the junior section. The expansion continued in 2004 with the addition of an administration block, marking the school's transition to a fully-fledged institution. This new facility featured a principal's office, deputy principals, a secretary, a receptionist, an accounts office, and spacious staffroom, resembling a model C school with promising growth prospects.

Administrative and Academic Developments

The principal's demanding schedule, involving teaching and overseeing construction, impacted academic supervision. In response, the Franciscan Clarist Congregation sent Sr. Chrystel as the first Deputy Principal, also teaching Mathematics. When Sr. Chrystel returned to India in 2006, she was succeeded by Sr. Rose Joice.

By 2008, Khanyisa's efforts in expanding its curriculum bore fruit. The school's notable improvement in matric results attracted national attention. The Principal and the Chairperson of the School Governing Council were invited to Pretoria, where they received a Certificate of Achievement from the Deputy President for the most improved school, and commendation from the National Minister of Education for producing over 100 exemptions.

Recognition and Support

Given the school's low fees and limited support from the Department of Education, attracting experienced teachers proved challenging. Many staff members were recent graduates, but a few dedicated teachers stayed with Khanyisa despite the difficulties. In 2006, the School Council recognized their loyalty with a fully-paid 18-day holiday in Europe.

Sports and Facilities

The construction of an Olympic-sized swimming pool with a solar heating system was completed, meeting all requirements for professional aquatic sports in South Africa. Additionally, Khanyisa procured 0.709 km² of land in Payne Location for developing sports fields, addressing the long-standing need for adequate sporting facilities.

Community Outreach

In response to the HIV/AIDS crisis, Khanyisa established the Khanyisa Children's Home in 2006. The home caters to infants and toddlers affected by the pandemic, providing care for 25 infants and 40 toddlers. Managed by the Franciscan Clarist Sisters and other caregivers, the home relies on minimal government support and contributions from local individuals, Khanyisa alumni, and the school itself.

Modernisation

In 2010, the school completed a multi-facility centre housing three computer laboratories, a library, a media centre, and a books storeroom. With 120 computers, internet access, and a growing library of over 10,000 books, the school emphasizes computer literacy and reading. The addition of a second Deputy Principal, Ms. Lawana, in 2013, further enhanced academic management.

Current Status and Future Plans

From its inception as a two-classroom school in a rural church hall in 1994, Khanyisa has expanded to include 33 classrooms, a large hall, science laboratories, computer labs, a library, and a media centre. With an enrolment of 1,354 students from Grades 8 to 12, the school is equipped with an administration block, staff houses, school buses, and boreholes for water supply.

Plans are underway to develop Khanyisa 2, a new school from Grades 1 to 12, located next to North Crest, in response to the high demand for enrolment. This new expansion will continue Khanyisa's legacy of growth and excellence in education.




In October 2000 the school was officially opened and blessed by Bishop Oswald Heirmer, the Bishop of Umtata.



Khanyisa Children's Home is an outreach programme at Khanyisa High School and the brainchild of Mr. Sebastian Vattakunnel the Principal of Khanyisa High School and the Roman Catholic Diocese of Mthatha. It is run by Franciscan Clarist sisters in the Mthatha Diocese and Sr. Serene Maria FCC is incharge of the Children's Home.

The Children's Home was officially inaugurated on the 25th of July 2006. As part of our outreach programme, our Children's Home provides basic necessities such as shelter, healthy and balanced meals, clothing, basic health care services, recreational facilities and developmental programmes to abandoned, orphaned, abused, neglected and HIV/AIDS infected or affected children. It is a safe haven for vulnerable children around the OR Tambo, Alfred Nzo and Chris Hani District Municipalities. Ever since its inception, it has given shelter to 92 vulnerable children in sheer need of a place of safety. Admission starts from birth until the age of 5 years. Children are brought in by social workers from the Department of Social Development, Child Protection Organisations, SAPS officials and other recognised Social Service professionals. At present, our safe home houses 25 infants and 40 toddlers. A practiced pediatrician who studied and worked as a pediatrics doctor in Italy and India, Sr. Sebastine Maria FCC, lives with them.

CELEBRATING THE SERVICE OF SR. ROSE JOICE



ucator. In 1992, she was permanently appointed in Teekoy. In 1993, she was sent to Christ School Bangalore for 1 year. In 1995 January 22nd I came to South Africa and started to work in Mount Nicholas school Libode with Ursuline sisters. In the year of 2000, I was transferred to St Joseph Pastoral Centre Port Elizabeth, there I worked for 6 years. In the end of 2006 she joined at Khanyisa High School as a deputy principal for administration, this is her current post.

Sr. Rose represents a powerful legacy of faith and service. Her journeys remind us of the profound impact one can have on the world through commitment and love.

BIOGRAPHY OF FR URS WALTER FISCHER CMM

Fr Urs Fischer was born on the 23 December 1937 in Egerkingen, Canton Solothum, as the fourth child of Max and Rosa Fischer-Brunner. His father was a teacher in Egerkingen a small village where he grew up. His mother came from Balsthal and was baptised Walter. Going to Church every day was part of his upbringing.

After finishing school in Altdorf a desire to become a priest grew in him, and after his matriculation in Altdorf he told his nephew here present when he was a student, he came across a magazine that had a picture of the Cathedral in uMthatha and told his nephew that he knew from that time that he wanted to go to the Missions in Africa.

He then applied to enter our Congregation, to do his Noviciate and did his first profession on the 8th of December 1959. He then studied his philosophy and theology in Wurzburg. He was ordained priest on the 28th of June, 1964 in Visp in the Valais, and celebrated his thanksgiving Holy Mass in his home village Egerkingen

Fr. Urs arrived in South Africa on the 10nth of March, 1966. Like all missionaries arriving here in South Africa he had to learn English, and therefore attended a six weeks course at the School run by the Brothers in Hibberdene. Thereafter he was sent to St Mary's Seminary in Ixopo. Thereafter he was then assigned to St Paul's in Bulwer, eNkelabantwana as it was known at that time. His first Parish in 1968 was in Park Rynie. He later had to learn Zulu. And during this time he received the news that his father had died at the end of 1969. So he had never seen his father again after his departure. This loss was difficult for Walter, writes his nephew Urs Junior.

In 1970 the then Provincial Fr Michael Frey, wrote to Fr Urs that with the consent of the General Government and the Provincial and his Councillors, he was appointed Novice master here in the Monastery Mariannhill. This he did for six years.

In 1975 Bishop Martin Elmar, the Bishop at that time wrote to Fr Urs asking him to go and help at St Magdalene's Mission on two Sundays a month to help Fr Victricius Werner. At one stage he also helped out in St Anne's in Umzinto. 19772003: Fr Urs was transferred to uMthatha in the Transkei to be Provincial, and Pastor in Libode. Now he had to learn Xhosa. From 1980 to 2001 he served as Parish Priest in the Cathedral (All Saints) in uMthatha.

From 1995 he was Parish Priest of Ascension Parish which he established. Throughout his life he placed great importance on education for the local people. During his years in Umthatha he established the following:

Further development of St Joseph's JSS Norwood Founding the Holy Cross High School Zingisa High School Khanyisa High School

Kwa Payn outstation plus 7 Kindergardens and day care centres in and around uMthatha.

In 2003 he moved back to Mariannhill, at the time of Fr Vincent Bonginkosi Mdabe as Provincial, he was appointed Director of the Retreat House here in Mariannhill. Although it was said to be for three years, Fr Urs stayed there until he retired.

Fr Urs stayed in the Retreat House till 2017 when he finally joined the retired and elderly Confreres at Mater Dolorosa Home for his retirement. What was diagnosed in 2008 never left Fr Urs health. His heart gave him no rest, High Blood Pressure, and his hearing went bad. This was his daily cross which he carried until his death on the 11th of June, 2024 when he finally breathed his last. By then he was 87 years of age and in his 60th priestly Anniversary which he would have celebrated this month. This was never to be.

Although retired in Mater Dolorosa Home he never stopped directing people on Retreat, and remained Confessor and Spiritual director to many people.

May he rest in Peace.

MILESTONE MOMENTS: KEY EVENTS OVER THE YEARS

As Khanyisa High School celebrates its 30th anniversary, we take a look back at some of the key events and milestones that have shaped our school's rich history. From our humble beginnings to becoming a cornerstone of the community, here are some highlights that mark our journey:

1. 1994: The Inaugural Year

Khanyisa Senior Secondary School opened in a parish hall with 93 students and a small staff, led by Mr. Sebastian Vattakunnel. Mathematics was made compulsory for all students, and teaching began despite limited resources and infrastructure.

- 2. **1995:** The school relocated to new premises provided by the KwaLindile community, funded by a R250,000 donation from Father Fischer.
- 3. 1998: Six additional classrooms were added to accommodate the growing student body.
- 4. **1999-2000:** Construction began on a School Hall, two Science laboratories, and a kitchen. These facilities were officially opened and blessed by Bishop Oswald Heirmer in October 2000.
- 5. **2001**: Two more classroom blocks were constructed.
- 6. **2003**: The school expanded to include Grades 7, 8, and 9, with a new block of six classrooms built to support this expansion.
- 7. **2004**: An administration block was added, including offices for the principal and deputies, as well as other administrative spaces, marking the school's transformation into a fully-fledged institution.
- 8. **2006**: The school established the Khanyisa Children's Home to support young children affected by HIV/AIDS. The school also recognized dedicated staff members with a fully-paid holiday in Europe.
- 9. **2008**: Khanyisa's improved matric results garnered national attention. The Principal and the Chairperson of the School Governing Council received a Certificate of Achievement from the Deputy President.
- 10. **2010**: A multi-facility centre was completed, featuring three computer laboratories, a library, a media centre, and a books storeroom. Computer literacy became compulsory for all students.
- 11. 2017: Construction of an Olympic size swimming pool
- 12. 2019: Silver Jubilee Celebrations
- 13. **2020:** Adaptation and Innovation Remote Learning Initiative: In response to global challenges of Covid 19, Khanyisa High School swiftly adapted to remote learning, ensuring that education continued seamlessly during unprecedented times.
- 14. **2024:** 30th Anniversary Celebration: A grand celebration marked our 30th anniversary, featuring a gala event, a retrospective exhibition of school achievements, and a special commemorative publication highlighting our journey.




